

JESUS ON GREATNESS

READ: Matthew 18:1-11

There is a quest for greatness in every human heart. Created in God's image, we were made to reach for the stars. We were made to use our gifts and abilities to achieve and attain our best. In every human heart, there is also the propensity to become prideful and arrogant. When sin entered the world, and therefore into our lives, it impacted everything including the human quest for greatness. When you see the sin of pride and arrogance in other people's lives it more than likely turns you off. But what about in yourself? Jesus' disciples came to him one day asking the question, "Which one of us is greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven?" The disciple's quest for greatness was going in a direction that offended Jesus and what he stood for as God's Son. A lesson on greatness was in order for his disciples that day and the same lesson that Jesus taught his followers then continues to inform, challenge and correct his followers to this day, including you and me.

6. In what ways is "getting right in our relationship with God" a good biblical definition of greatness?

7. How does Philippians 2:1-11 support what Jesus is teaching us, as his disciples, about humility?

8. What is a definition of humility you can put into practice in your life?

Lord, help us understand and put your Son's definition of greatness into practice in our lives. We want to be great in your eyes, but we confess that our pride and arrogance gets in the way causing us to stray from who you want us to be. We confess our sin of pride.
