Read Your Bible

Psalm 51:10-12, Matthew 13:14-17

Apply God’s Word to Your Life

1. Why does God desire for us to have a pure heart?
2. In what ways does a hardened heart affect our ability to see and to hear clearly?
3. In what ways have you hardened your own heart?
4. Think of a time when God used something that had broken your heart to get your attention. What did it produce?
5. In what way would God desire our heart to be broken? What is our heart to break from?
6. How do we allow God to purify our hearts? How do we allow God to give us a new heart? (See Psalm 119:11)

Being wounded by someone you never would have imagined is an exceedingly difficult thing. This can lead to a hardening of your heart for fear of it getting hurt again. It can impact many of your relationships that follow. The process of God working and softening your heart can be a beautiful, yet painful experience. God so often uses our broken hearts because it is such a painful experience. In fact, it drives us to our knees pleading to get relief from the pain.
