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SERMON SERIES

JANUARY 22-MARCH 2 | FOR THE ONE

We have one God. We are one church. We are on one mission together: For the ONE. God's heartbeat is to bring his children home. Lost in our sin, we are all "the one" that Jesus went into the wilderness to pursue. Jesus engages and loves those the world often forgets. How do we as a church have our hearts broken for whom Jesus' heart beats?

March 9-April 6 | Living On A Prayer

Sometimes we treat prayer as a cosmic slot machine. Let's throw a request, and if we are lucky, God will answer. But prayer is so much more than that. It is how we have a relationship with God. Our God invites us to personally communicate with Him. Prayer is not a static religious obligation, but a dynamic Holy Spirit led transformation. This series will look at examples of prayer in the bible for us to think about how we pray.

April 23-June 1 | Holy Spirit-Wind and Fire

Who is the Holy Spirit? What does the Holy Spirit have to do with my life? In this series we will take a deep dive and look at the work of the Holy Spirit.

March 5 | ASH WEDNESDAY

In the beginning, God made us and gave us a choice: life with God forever, or knowledge of good and evil. We chose knowledge, and evil entered the world. Sin and death entered the world. Throughout the Old Testament, God's people waited for a Savior to rescue them from sin and death. On Ash Wednesday, Christians receive the mark of the cross from last year's palm ashes and the words, "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19)—reminding us of our mortality and our need for a Savior.

HOLY WEEK & EASTER

April 9 & 13 | Palm Week (Palm Sunday)

The Sunday before Easter, Jesus triumphantly entered Jerusalem on a donkey's back, proclaiming Himself to be the promised Savior of the Old Testament. Crowds waved palm fronds and shouted, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (John 12:13). Christians wave palm fronds and sing "Hosanna!" (meaning "Save us!") to kick-start Holy Week—the week of Jesus' last supper, death, and resurrection.

At Hope we celebrate on Wednesday and Sunday.

April 17 | Maundy Thursday

On Thursday, Jesus shared one last supper with His disciples. He broke bread, saying, "This is my body," and passed wine, saying, "This is my blood"—instituting the sacrament of Holy Communion. Afterward, He gave us a new mandate (Maundy means "mandate"): "Love one another" (John 13:34). Here at Hope, our fifth graders receive their First Communion on Maundy Thursday.

April 18 | Good Friday

On Friday, Jesus suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. God died for us. Why would we call the darkest day in history "good?" Because Jesus died for us and for our salvation. Because Jesus died for our good. Jesus gave his life: "No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again." (John 10:18).

April 19 & 20 – Easter Worship

"He is not here; He has risen!" (Luke 24:6) Death wasn't the end for Jesus. On Sunday, Jesus rose from the dead, proving His power over sin and death. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die" (John 11:25). Because of Easter Sunday, death isn't the end for Christians. The Risen Jesus resurrects all believers to enjoy eternal life with Him. Come and celebrate Easter with us and invite others to join you!

FOR THE ONE

God's heart is for the lost. In Luke chapter 15, Jesus tells a series of stories that illustrate God's desire for His people to come home: the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the prodigal son. Through these stories we are reminded that there is much celebration in Heaven when the lost have been found.

3 Then Jesus told them this parable: 4 "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? 5 And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders 6 and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep.' 7 I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent.

- Luke 15:3-7

When Hope Lutheran Church was founded in 1958 by Pastor Bud Roufs, he stated the following, "If Hope is to succeed, two things must be true. First, that people would be won for Jesus Christ and second, that we would help people grow as disciples in faith and maturity." These have shaped the mission of our church, to encourage all people to know the love of Christ, ever since.

We are a church that exists For the ONE. For the young one to learn how much they are loved by God. For the broken one to find healing and restoration in Christ. For the addicted and held captive one to be set free. For the grieving one to find hope amid sorrow. For the prideful one to be brought to humility. For the one who is lost and lonely to be found and made whole through the ONE, Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior. We will not stop, we will not rest, until all people know the love of Christ. Like our good shepherd, we are asked to leave the 99 and seek out and save the one.

Imagine the person you are praying for who is lost, or feels far from God, to be found. Imagine those in our community who do not yet know the love of Christ being welcomed into a caring church community like ours and being won for Jesus Christ. Then remember how grateful you are to be among those who were once lost but are now found in Jesus.

Ten years ago, in our Decade of Hope campaign, God gave us a vision to launch our West Campus to meet the growth of our community and to reach the ONE. In the fall of 2019, we held our first West Campus worship service at Liberty Middle School. Since then, West Campus meets in a space that serves us well but is often busting at the seams. Our goal is to build a permanent ministry facility and update current youth ministry spaces so that we may continue fulfilling our mission. This location will serve our current West Campus families well and position us for future growth as we seek to reach the ONE!

Consider how you might pray, engage, and give to help in God's work in our community through Hope to reach those who do not yet know the love of Christ - including the ONE your heart longs to reach for Jesus.

Below are a few brief stories that have been shared with us about God's work in the people of Hope. We call these Shine Stories or Defining Moments. Let these stories inspire you to consider how God has worked in your life, and to compel you to act to help reach the ONE.

Rachel has a four and two-year-old in Hope Youth. She writes, "Both of my children have been through the Hopetots ministry, and we have all been blessed by the staff, volunteers, and programming. My son, Henry (4), loves stories and because he started hearing stories from the Bible at an early age, he has been able to remember them and recognize the importance of the stories and characters in the Bible. He can be shy, so it was great having him enrolled at a young age, so he was used to attending programing as he grew. He also loved playing with the toys at Hopetots! My daughter, Eleanor (2) loves music. She always comes home from Hopetots singing a song. In fact, she sings them everywhere we go. There have been multiple times where we have been walking around a store and she is singing a song from Hopetots as we browse through the aisles. If you hear a two-year-old singing "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord" very enthusiastically while you are getting groceries, they probably attend Hopetots! My two children are so different, but both have had opportunities to connect with activities and people at Hopetots."

Faith has never come easy to Addison. She has always had questions about her faith journey but never had anyone to answer them. By God's grace, she got plugged into a middle school small group at Hope where her small group guides expressed interest in her and her questions. The past two years, Addison has attended our Believe Retreat at Castaway Club on Pelican Lake, where her faith in Jesus has continued to be challenged and stretched. This past October, after being at camp and feeling led by the Holy Spirit, she made the decision to be baptized down in the lake, something that she had never had an interest in doing prior. God is on the move in Addison's life, along with many of our youth at Hope.

Katie was a teacher who kept hearing students talk about HSM (High School Ministry) at Hope. "I was a high school science teacher for ten years. During that time, I was blessed to be included in the high school student-led girls Bible study. As part of that opportunity, I often heard students discuss how much they enjoyed HSM." Katie said "yes" to being an HSM small group guide. "We started last year with a group of three that grew to a group of seven girls from three different high schools. Every week we worship together, pray together, read Scripture together, ask questions, support one another, and encourage each other. The time spent at HSM is just as impactful for my personal faith journey as it is for the students that attend."

"My name is Jenna and my husband, son and I go to your church. We got married there, baptized our son, and now our son is five. We started him in Hopekids last year and attended VBX for the first time this summer. When I was that young, I did not get the opportunity to be involved in church. I didn't really think kids picked up as much as they do. Today our son's teacher at daycare messaged us. He was singing a church song to himself and told his friend about God. My heart melted! Thank you to everyone at Hope! You are truly making a difference and helping shape souls!"

"We are all called to make disciples, and it is very rewarding work, but sometimes we forget. I want to encourage others to get involved, especially with youth, to help build them up and to make sure they have the resources and supports they need as they grow," - Earl Behrens, Hope member and volunteer working with troubled youth.

BEGINNER'S GUIDE TO S'

HOW TO STUDY

So, you're interested in studying the Bible? What an incredible way to grow in your faith! Bible study can be anything that gets us digging into God's word. Whether daily, or weekly, in the morning, at lunch, or in the evening, it's all beneficial. The key is finding something that works for you and doing it consistently.

Being deeply rooted in God's word is one of our Culture of Hope core shared values. Biblical literacy helps draw people's imagination to live-in and live-out God's story. This is why we put so much emphasis on Bible studies and following the narrative lectionary – having the entire congregation focusing on the same scriptures each week from Deeply Rooted to Hopekids. We do this so that adults can more fully connect with what their children are learning in youth programming, and so that people are more confident sharing Jesus' love.

One of the first steps to studying the Bible is to have a translation that you feel comfortable reading and understanding. Hope Lutheran typically uses the NIV (New International Version). If you are looking for a Bible, the Adult Ministry team recommends you consider an NIV Study Bible. If you need assistance in obtaining a Bible, please email adults@fargohope.org.


There are excellent online Bible resources available at no cost, including biblegateway.com, and bible.com (YouVersion app). Reading the Bible online is an excellent option because you can access it anywhere you go. Online Bible options, including apps, also offer Bible reading plans, various translations, and study tools to help you be consistent. Many of these plans and studies are topical, meaning you can find something that is meaningful for what you are experiencing: anxiety, parenting, grief, or life stage transition.

Most Bible apps, like YouVersion, offer an audio Bible, as well as having options for doing studies with others using chat features. This way, you can invite your friends and do the study together online from wherever you are. Another way to study the bible weekly wherever you go, is to listen to Hope's Deeply Rooted Bible study podcast which can be found on our Fargo Hope app (see page 11 for details) and anywhere that podcasts are shared.

One of the best ways to develop consistency and accountability for studying your Bible regularly is to do a study with others. Hope offers numerous opportunities for Bible study and Christian fellowship in large and small group formats. LIVING ON A PRAYER - HOW TO PRAY

As Christians, many of us have been taught to pray from the time we are very young. From saying grace before a meal, or offering a prayer before bedtime, to learning the Lord's Prayer in Hopekids - most of us know one or more prayers. Yet many Christians find it difficult to pray, or to pray regularly, because they feel as if they don't know how to pray beyond the types of prayers previously listed. So, let's explore what prayer is and some easy ways to pray.

First, prayer is practice of connecting with God - a way to share our hearts and align our will with our Creator. Through prayer, we bring our worries, gratitude, and requests to God. In return, He hears our prayers and offers us peace. (Philippians 4:6-7) What is not required for prayer are fancy words, or perfect rituals. Prayer is simply a conversation with God.

While prayer does not need to take a specific format, many people like to have structure to their prayer. The Lord's Prayer is a great example of how to structure a prayer, but if you are looking to pray in your own words remember this acronym: PRAY – Praise, Repent, Ask, Yield.

The Bible itself also offers a number of prayers that can help us find words when we have specific need. Here are a few examples to guide you:

PRAISE - Hannah's Prayer (1 Samuel 1:9-20), Jonah 2:1-10

REQUEST - Solomon's Prayer for Wisdom (1 Kings 3:1-15)

SUPPLICATION (begging earnestly/humbly) - Elijiah's Prayer (1 Kings 18:30-39)

INTERCESSION - Hagar's prayer (Gen 16:1-16), Abraham's prayer for Sodom (Genesis 18:16-33),

LAMENT - Job's prayer of anguish (Job 3)

CONFESSION - David/Psalm 51, Daniel's Prayer (Daniel 9)

If you'd like to learn more about these prayers and how to pray, be sure to join us in worship March 9-April 6 for our Lent sermon series Living on a Prayer where our pastors will examine these prayers and get you thinking about how and why we pray.

Karen Moore has been involved in the Adult Silent Retreats at Hope since they began in 2018. This March will be the retreat's 8th year. A silent retreat is time set aside to come and learn how to connect with God in prayer, and how to listen for Him to respond.

The retreat was created due to people expressing an interest in going deeper in their prayer life and growing in their faith. As the name implies, attendees are silent. But in that time, they are learning about how to settle their minds for more meaningful prayer and deeper connection with God.

"Whenever I tell people about the Silent Retreat, I say do not let the word 'silent' scare you. Yes, we are quiet, but you are talking to God in your mind the whole time. You are also truly learning how to listen to what is on God's mind, and how to hear from Him. Taking time to learn how to have this quiet time of prayer and reflection really helps us to connect with God and grow in our faith. I feel that I grow in my faith each year, and the people who attend often tell me the same," said Karen. This year's theme is Seeking Jesus and the key verse is Jeremiah 29: 13, "You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart."

The retreat starts on Friday night with a speaker and some time to yourself to ponder what you have learned.
Attendees are often given a particular scripture to focus on during their quiet time and are encouraged to bring a journal to write down their thoughts.
Saturday features three additional speakers and a lunch, which is also eaten in silence.

"I remember initially thinking, 'how on Earth are we going to eat in silence' as mealtime is often such a natural time to connect with others. But to be honest, being silent during mealtime certainly makes you think about the food you are

consuming and how God provided it," said Karen. Guest speakers will be teaching about different types of prayer. There will also be some handson and walking activities – including a labyrinth, for those who want to keep their hands occupied or move around as they pray.

"If you are thinking about coming to the silent retreat, I would encourage you to be brave and come. I know it's hard to walk through the doors the first time, especially if you're coming alone. But I think you'll find that taking the opportunity to make spending time with God a priority was a good choice. Over the years these retreats continue to grow my faith. Digging into scripture has changed my prayer life, and learning to stop and listen to God, even when I am busy, has helped me walk closer with Christ. I hope that more men and women will come learn how to spend quiet time with God," said Karen.
