Conclusion

In Jesus' parable we see prayers of two different depths. The Pharisee's prayer is shallow. It is a vain cry for attention that puts all the emphasis on the actions of the Pharisee. The tax collector's prayer is deep. It is an honest reflection of his hurt and sin and plea for God's merciful action in his life. The surprise of this story is that kind of prayer that Jesus says justifies, or makes us right with God, does not come from the religious leader but from the tax collector, who would have been seen as a sinner. What God desires from us is real, honest, consistent prayer. When we are real with God and come to Him with our sin and hurt, we are met with His mercy and grace.
