Conclusion

I truly struggle with this line in Isaiah, "and the government will be on his shoulders." I believe it, no doubt, but there is so much going on here. I found it helpful to first look at the context. Simply put, the first hearers of Isaiah's prophecy were in trouble. Their nation was doomed. Yet in the doom, Isaiah also spoke of hope. That hope was in a child. Many scholars believe the first fulfilment of this prophecy was the child to be king, Hezekiah. One of those titles given was regarding the government on his shoulders. While Hezekiah was a glimmer of hope, his life and reign ended. It clearly seems that God was speaking through Isaiah to point to an even greater and eternal hope, Jesus. Jesus was no typical king. His birth and life were humble. He chose a donkey to ride over a horse. He washed feet. And he died. The cross was his throne. It was here where he was most publicly acclaimed, "king." But Jesus is no typical king. Most kings, when they die, stay dead. Not Jesus. He rose to new and everlasting life! He is reigning! Our task is to acclaim him our King and invite others to join the never-ending reign of Christ.
