Conclusion

The story of Lydia's conversion is interesting on several fronts. We sense the excitement of the travels of the early Christians. They move with haste from one place to the next. There is an urgency in their mission to share the good news of Jesus, yet they are present in the people they meet in the places they visit. It is on a Sabbath day that they gather with believers in God. Mingling with the crowd, they meet Lydia who is curious in many ways. She is a businesswoman, uncommon at the time. She is a Gentile believer in God. She also appears to be the head of her household, which is also uncommon for a woman in this context. The first recorded European convert, Lydia is transformed by the message of the Gospel. By the power of the Holy Spirit, she is brought into a next step of faith. She goes from belief in God to following the way of Jesus. In this conversion, her life and the life of her household is transformed. She will later be a place of respite for Paul and Silas when they come out of prison.
