Conclusion

This commandment seems simple enough. Do not steal. It would seem like a principle that most people could get behind. The commandment is much deeper. In his Small Catechism written in 1529, Martin Luther offers a helpful explanation of this simple command. He writes that not only are we not to take from our neighbor, but instead “help him to improve and protect his property and means of making a living.” The

commandment is not simply about what we should not do, but also about what we should do in caring for the lives of those around us. Jesus makes an important statement as he pairs thieves with the life that he offers. He says that thieves kill and destroy but he offers an abundant life. Stealing comes from not having what we need or want. It is motivated by necessity and greed, but Jesus gives us a life where we have what we need, salvation, eternity, and hope in Him.
