Conclusion

The commandment to "honor your father and mother..." is a commandment that is mentioned several times in scripture. A non-exhaustive list includes Exodus, Deuteronomy, Matthew, Mark, and

Ephesians. Clearly, this commandment is important for us to keep. And when we break it, we need to repent of our sin.

Jesus speaks to the commandment in that we need to have integrity in our keeping of it. Jesus calls out the abusive practice called "Corban." Corban is a Hebrew word that can be translated as offering. The practice of declaring property Corban had devolved into a scheme where property was dedicated for religious purposes upon the owner's death. However, that dedicated property could not be used for any secular practice including caring for aging parents. Therefor the owner could benefit from the property, and yet not be obligated or allowed to help their parents with that property.

We need to seriously consider Jesus' teaching. This commandment runs through every facet of our lives. The reformer, Martin Luther, rightly interpreted the intent of this commandment in The Small Catechism. It reads, "We are to fear and love God, so that we neither despise nor anger our parents and others in authority, but instead honor, serve, obey, love, and respect them."
