Conclusion

Deuteronomy is Moses' farewell discourse to the Hebrews. In these specific verses, Moses recounts the establishment of the covenant that leads to the Ten Commandments. He reminds them that the covenant is for every generation of Israelites. Most importantly in these verses, the covenant and subsequent Commandments begins with God grace. "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery." The Law is there to promote order and direct the people to live as God's chosen people.

As people bound to sin, often our experience with the Law is negative. St. Paul leads us through his experience. He begins and ends with the premise that the Law is good. The Law however, points out our sin and makes it evident that we are far from God and it will kill us. The Law makes us cry out for a savior. Later in Romans 7:25 Paul writes, "Thanks be to God, who delivers me through Jesus Christ our Lord!" Not only does the Law promote order and convict us in our sin, it helps us in our daily lives as followers of Jesus. It guides us to live a pleasing life to God, and to be examples of Christ for our neighbor.
