Introduction:

Remember you are dust. These words are difficult to grasp in a world that wants to avoid the reality of loss and death. The brokenness of this world and the reality of sin cannot be escaped. We are dust. Our bodies and our lives are not forever. This world is fading away. At the same time, in Jesus, we are called by His grace into an eternal life. On Ash Wednesday, the ashes remind us of our mortality and the frailty of life. The cross reminds us of the sacrifice of Jesus, that He became mortal, lived, and died, to extend his mercy to a sin-filled world. By grace He calls us from the ashes into a new life with him. We are mortal. We are broken. We are dust. Yet in Christ, we are forgiven. We are forgiven and made new. We are called into everlasting life. Praise be to God!
