

## Love One Another

### Introduction:

Somewhere on my bookshelf is one of my High School Yearbooks. My children refer to it as ancient literature. I think they are correct. This particular Yearbook has the question on the cover, "Now What?" You made it through your sophomore year, now what? You graduated, now what? Both readings below ask the hearer that same question, "Now what?"

The prophet Micah is taking the northern Kingdom of Israel to court. He is the prosecutor. The Lord is the plaintiff and the judge. The mountains and the hills are the jury. The case is simple. The Lord has saved his people...more than once. The people have forgotten and wandered away. What should we do since the Lord has saved us, again and again? Now what? Micah sarcastically lists three sacrifices: rams, oil, and blood. These are not what the Lord wants. Rather, we are to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God.

Jesus brings salvation to the whole world. He's about to show the depth of his love. He will die for the sin of the world. Jesus is the fulfillment acting with justice, loving mercy, and walking humbly with our God. He washes feet, he serves, he saves, he loves. Now what? We are to love like he loved. We are to love one another.
