

Holy Spirit: Wind and Fire | Pentecost

Introduction:

Throughout the Old Testament, God gave assurances of His presence through visible and audible signs such as fire, wind, and inspired speech. At Pentecost, He further restored His covenant relationship with His people when the power of the Holy Spirit came to rest upon individual believers.

After Jesus went to the cross and rose from the grave, he appeared to the disciples for another 40 days (Acts 1:3). The risen Jesus told his disciples that he needed to leave them, but he would send the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, to be with them (John 14:26). He told them to go to Jerusalem and wait for that gift (Acts 1:4-5). On the day of Pentecost, 50 days after the Resurrection, the Holy Spirit came with a rush of wind, “tongues of fire...came to rest on each of them... [and they] were filled with the Holy Spirit...” (Acts 2:2-4).

The coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost is a progression of God’s redemptive story for His people throughout the Bible. First-century Jews would have understood fire as a sign of God’s presence with them such as the “pillar of fire” guiding the Israelites by night (Ex.13:21), the “consuming fire” on Mount Sinai (Ex.24:17), and the fire in the cloud over the tabernacle in the wilderness (Ex. 40:38). Under the old covenant, the fire that represented the presence of God was either for all of Israel or specific individuals at specific moments. But at Pentecost, under the new covenant established by Jesus, and as the gift promised by the Father, the fire representing God’s presence separated and rested on the Apostles individually, and they were filled with the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:3-4). Peter explained that the gift and promise of the Holy Spirit wasn’t only for the Apostles, but also for everyone who would

repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ throughout the nations and generations (Acts 2:38-39).

The coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost marks a powerful new beginning to God's more individual and intimate covenant relationship and presence with His people.
